A Message from the President Linda Sue Wever

In a letter recently mailed out to the Congregation, Linda Sue Wever, TBT President, discussed the State of the Temple and reiterated the need for more member involvement and increased financial support. The hope is that each member will do a bit more to help TBT thrive and survive. The following is the letter referenced:

My fellow congregants,

The High Holidays have past and the New Year is well underway, so I wanted to reach out to you about the State of the Temple. First of all, I want to thank all those that stepped forward by volunteering and donated financially both during and after the holidays.

As I have mentioned in my appeals this year and last, the foundation of TBT is built upon the dedication and commitment of members like you, without whom we couldn't operate. The truth is, though, that we have not received enough of this dedication and commitment, and we need more, which is the reason for my letter.

Over the past five years we've seen our membership decline. In order to operate optimally and be a healthy Temple we need to have 120 membership units and, as of this year, we have decreased to fewer than 90 membership units. What does this mean? It means that we need to ask each of you to do more.

In order for our congregation to move from a state of fair to a state of good, and very good, we need to grow our membership and we need to bring in more revenue. Our numbers and donations need to increase over the next year, not decrease. We need people donating more and not less.

With each year, our expenses here at TBT grow (specifically with respect to our lease), and if our congregation and membership don't grow we will not be able to continue to be a place of Jewish learning, Jewish community and Jewish fellowship. We will just cease.

I need each of you to challenge yourselves, as I said during last year's High Holidays, to contribute more. Let's make a promise together that we will try and break new membership numbers and donations of years past and make 2015-2016 the year to beat as the best yet at TBT.

Please take the attached donation form, fill it out and bring or send it in, accompanied by a check, so that you and your family can say that you were there when the Temple needed you. You stepped up to show of your commitment and desire to have TBT here for your children and their children, and as a beacon for others within the community.

Also please try to make a commitment to volunteer for something at TBT - join a committee, be on a board, or work as a school teacher. Perhaps even consider helping with services and special events. We need your time to make our TBT community stronger.

I am so proud and honored to be a part of Temple Beth Torah and want to be able to have it standing here for many more generations to enjoy and to partake and for many more presidents to be able to stand up and say those 7 little words – "The State of the Temple is Excellent."

A Message from the Rabbi Kenneth Block

Gor Nicht Helfen

I grew up in Brookline MA near Coolidge Corner. My mother's parents and unmarried sister along with my sister and parents experienced life together in the Eisenhower 50's. Switching bedrooms was a common experience as family members died. Listening to a philosophy that spanned not only generations, but continents as well was another shared experience.

So when grandma, grandfather, aunt Lil, or my parents heard the news and responded with the Yiddish expression "Gor Nicht Helfen", meaning there is no hope, we all would nod in agreement. Parenthetically, I never remember hearing an expression that means there is hope. Their expression of futility and hopelessness was not reserved for the news as reported in the media of the day, but for any information, whether personal or public.

A leak in the roof, a broken washing machine, news of another victim of the big "C", the unGodly communists planning an attack, trouble in Israel, car trouble, tzoris is tzoris there is no hierarchy, no priority, all these events just prove that "Gor Nicht Helfen", there is no hope.

So let's make a list of all the reasons why there is no hope:

- The murder of French citizens by Muslim terrorists.
- The city of Baltimore recording 300 murder victims to date.
- The choices in the 2016 Presidential election.
- The Rabbi's upcoming sermons.
- Chilling video promising terrorist attacks on DC.
- 23 shootings on college campuses to date.
- Social Security recipients will not receive a COLA.
- About 48 million people 1 in 6 Americans contracted some form of food poisoning last year, according to the CDC.
- There was a major food recall every week last year.
- The FDA has had over 1000 serious drug recalls to date.
- Cheating in professional sports.

Please feel free to continue to add to your personal list at your leisure.

As long as human beings have recorded their experiences and reactions to life there have been more reasons to give up hope than to have it. Dante Alighieri defined hell as the place where there is no hope. So we can choose to live in hell at any time, just give up hope. However, it is not so easy to summon up hope these days. Not because there is more "hopelessness" around us but because the media revolution surrounds us, overwhelms us, and inundates us with how hopeless life is. And organized religion has not lived up to its responsibility to help us deal with life and has added to making living appear hopeless unless you sign on to their exclusive solution.

It wasn't until many years later and serving my student congregation in Logan West Virginia that I realized that I didn't need to live on the Titanic waiting for the inevitable iceberg or travel on the Hindenburg waiting for the inevitable explosion. There are reasons for hope and there are reasons for hopelessness. There is no calculus one can use to conclude that one is more dominant than the other.

Rabbi continued:

Hatikvah, the hope is our national anthem. Here is my message for the new year. Choose whether you will focus on hope or hopelessness. Which group occupies my thoughts? I know more people who have survived cancer than who have died from cancer. I know more people who have gotten their lives together after divorce than have not. I know more people who lived after an auto accident than died. I know more people who have been successful living with physical and emotional deficits than have not been successful.

Hope is not passive nor is it a spectacular sport. It is not about wishful thinking. Hope is about choosing our focus. Get a refund for the ticket you bought for the Titanic. Don't board the Hindenburg. Instead hope




The first Wednesday of each month, Rabbi Block will be leading Tanach Study. 7:30 - 8:30ish. No

A spirited classic of American Jewish literature, a historical novel about ancient sage-turned-apostate Elisha ben Abuyah in the late first century C.E. At the heart of the tale are questions about faith and the loss of faith and the repression and rebellion of the Jews of Palestine. Elisha is a leading scholar in Palestine, elected to

the Sanhedrin, the highest Jewish court in the land. But two tragedies awaken doubt about God in Elisha's mind, and doubt eats away at his faith. Declared a heretic and excommunicated from the Jewish community, he journeys to Antioch in nearby Syria to begin a quest through Greek and Roman culture for some fundamental irrefutable truth. The pace of the narrative picks up as Elisha directly encounters the full force of the ancient Romans' all-consuming culture. Ultimately, Elisha is forced by the power of Rome to choose between loyalty to his people, who are rebelling against the emperor's domination, and loyalty to his own quest for truth.

A Message from the Education Director Betsy Roth

It is traditional for a Jewish person to recite 100 Blessings a day. A Baracha, Blessing, can be recited by any individual. A person can also get credit for the Blessing recited by another. To get credit one must respond with the word Amen means "I believe-I agree with what you just said." That is why so often in our prayer service, the Rabbi or the Cantor will recite a prayer, and we all say, "Amen!"

So why is it important to recite 100 Blessings a day? Doesn't that seem like a lot? How hard is it to get to 100? If you were to look in our Mishkan Tefillah Siddur (prayer book) you would notice that the Morning Service contains a section called Birchot HaShachar, Morning Blessings. These are a set of Blessings we say early on in the service. There are about 15 Blessings right there. One is off to a very good start to the day with the Birchot HaShachar.

Once again, so why is it important to recite 100 Blessings a day? I've given that question a bit of thought over the years and have come up with different conclusions at different times. Prospective seems to shift with the times. Our working day is often fraught with challenges and stresses. The 100 Blessings are a reminder, no matter how forced it may seem, to refocus and re-center oneself. Even in times of trouble, we are expected to look at our daily lives and find the Blessings that we are gifted with. The past few weeks, the world we live in has been bruised. We have witnessed, seen, and felt the pain of our own citizens and those abroad. We are not to turn away from this. We should be aware of world events. Perhaps we can even help to heal. Yet amidst all this turmoil we are asked to look at what we have to be grateful for during the course of our day.

I've never challenged myself to see if I actually get to 100 Blessings a day. I am sure that I don't. But knowing that, I give myself extra credit when I take the time to linger on a simple moment in my day that I am thankful for. I find so many moments of gratitude during a typical school day at TBT. For that I say Thank You! Amen!
