I found that this is MY Temple Beth Torah, a place where my family and friends gather and share in common community and friendship. Arriving in town 23 years ago, it never occurred to me that not only would a town called Centreville become my home and my children's home, but that Temple Beth Torah would hold such meaning to me and where I choose to spend much of my time volunteering and being with friends.

That's a nice story that I just wrote, but you ask yourself, "What does this have to do with me?" Perhaps you have lived here all your life and have tons of friends and family and feel fulfilled, or perhaps you are here for a short time and have no time for that anything extra in your life. *George Carlin's wife died early in 2008 and George followed her, dying in July 2008. It is ironic George Carlin - comedian of the 70's and 80's - could write something so very eloquent and so very appropriate. An observation by George Carlin:*

“The paradox of our time in history is that we have taller buildings but shorter tempers, wider Freeways, but narrower viewpoints. We spend more, but have less, we buy more, but enjoy less. We have bigger houses and smaller families, more conveniences, but less time. We have more degrees but less sense, more knowledge, but less judgment, more experts, yet more problems, more medicine, but less wellness.

We drink too much, smoke too much, spend too recklessly, laugh too little, drive too fast, get too angry, stay up too late, get up too tired, read too little, watch TV too much, and pray too seldom.

We have multiplied our possessions, but reduced our values. We talk too much, love too seldom, and hate too often.

We've learned how to make a living, but not a life. We've added years to life not life to years. We've been all the way to the moon and back, but have trouble crossing the street to meet a new neighbor. We conquered outer space but not inner space. We've done larger things, but not better things.

We've cleaned up the air, but polluted the soul. We've conquered the atom, but not our prejudice. We write more, but learn less. We plan more, but accomplish less. We've learned to rush, but not to wait. We build more computers to hold more information, to produce more copies than ever, but we communicate less and less.

These are the times of fast foods and slow digestion, big men and small character, steep profits and shallow relationships. These are the days of two incomes but more divorce, fancier houses, but broken homes. These are days of quick trips, disposable diapers, throwaway morality, one night stands, overweight bodies, and pills that do everything from cheer, to quiet, to kill. It is a time when there is much in the showroom window and nothing in the stockroom. A time when technology can bring this letter to you, and a time when you can choose either to share this insight, or to just hit delete.

Remember to spend some time with your loved ones, because they are not going to be around forever.

Remember, say a kind word to someone who looks up to you in awe, because that little person soon will grow up and leave your side.

Remember, to give a warm hug to the one next to you, because that is the only treasure you can give with your heart and it doesn't cost a cent.

Remember, to say, 'I love you' to your partner and your loved ones, but most of all mean it. A kiss and an embrace will mend hurt when it comes from deep inside of you.

Remember to hold hands and cherish the moment for someday that person will not be there again.

Give time to love, give time to speak! And give time to share the precious thoughts in your mind.

And always remember, life is not measured by the number of breaths we take, but by those moments that take our breath away.”

# A Message from the Education Director

When I moved to the Washington area, from Israel, in the summer of 1990, I only knew a handful of people in this area. All of them happened to be friends of my husband. Howard had worked at Mutual Radio (located in Crystal City) before he set off for Israel, so this 'social circle' was all his.

Here I was, a Mom with a one-year old, looking to make connections. My first venture out was to be a substitute pre-school teacher at the JCCGW. Being a late comer to the 'J' pre-school, I needed to find another way to get my kid 'in!' In those days, the J was oversubscribed and the joke was you had to register your child in uteuro! Having missed that mark, subbing did solve the issue.

Reading the Jewish Week diligently, I noted that there was an open meeting for children of Holocaust Survivors, The Second Generation, Inc...new members welcomed! So began my first social venture with others who had a similar background and upbringing.

I involved myself in the Second Gen and a few years later became the President of the organization. So happens, in the year or two I was president, there were a number of 'perks!' The president (me) was invited to several Commemorative Events celebrating the end of World War II held in various Embassies around the DC area, including the British, Australian, Israeli, and Canadian Embassies. The only thing I can now remember about the British Embassy visit was that Howard couldn't join me. My elegant night out turned into a mournful day for our country in Oklahoma City, 1995.

I had TBT on my mind and in my heart during my recent trip to Israel. I brought the notes and messages from our students to the Western Wall (on a very cold and rainy day)! My friend June, the poster lady, took me to the Israeli Film Institute, where I grabbed as many posters as I could for our Annual Yom Atzmaut Celebration! I took the new Jerusalem Tram to Yad Vashem, the Israeli Holocaust museum. For a number of reasons I got there late in the afternoon. I was told that the Archives close at 5 and I would not be able to see the museum if I visited the

Archives. I had to make a choice.

For years, I had heard how the Children's Memorial at the museum was the most moving part. I was so torn, not knowing if or when I will ever have another opportunity to visit Israel again. But, I decided to visit the Archives. I had never been there before and not even sure if it was open to the public earlier on.

June was the one who told me that I actually had enough information to be able to track my Mother's testimony in Post War trials in Nuremberg in the 1960's. I was about nine-years old and she was gone for weeks. My time in the Archives was a session of helplessness and frustration. I left with almost as little information as I entered with.

It was getting late and dark in Jerusalem. Well, I couldn't get into the museum at this hour, but no one was going to keep me from walking around the grounds. I followed signs to what was labeled as the Children's Memorial. I even entered a pathway that seemed to be an outdoor garden. At the end of the path, I noted a door was open to my left. It was not locked so I entered.

Much to my amazement, it seemed that I had entered the Children's Memorial. It was not located 'inside' the museum but out in the hills! Inside it is dark and emotionally moving. I was the only person inside. I spent a number of minutes there knowing at that point why it was so important to be here. I thought about all our students at TBT. Our faculty does a wonderful job giving our students a Jewish Education. When they reach the 7<sup>th</sup> grade, the students visit the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum. This visit will take place on April 19 of this year. The 7<sup>th</sup> grade has been studying this period of time in our history since second semester. We know that, they too, will be moved by what they learn about see and hear. Our students are our future. They guarantee that this will Never Happen Again.

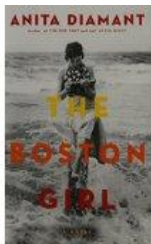

### **Lillie Jerome's Bat Mitzvah project**

Lillie Jerome is raising money for and awareness about the Service Dogs of Virginia for her Bat Mitzvah Project. This organization is currently training a balance dog for Lillie's family friend, Kristine. Lillie has also been a dog-lover her whole life and she was thrilled when her family adopted a rescue puppy, Brownie, in January 2014.

It costs approximately \$20,000 per year to raise and train a service dog and each dog is in the program one-and-a-half to two years. The organization trains physical assistance dogs, autism service dogs, and diabetic alert dogs.

On March 22, Lillie sold homemade dog treats at Temple Beth Torah to raise money for the organization. She plans to hold other fundraising events in her neighborhood and community, including a dog wash event. She is also planning to visit the group in Charlottesville, VA.

Kristine's dog, Schooner, will graduate from his training program with the Service Dogs of Virginia in early April and members and guests of Temple Beth Torah will be able to see him at Lillie's Bat Mitzvah on April 25!

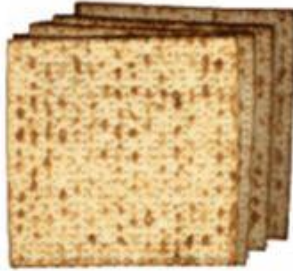
